

We would like to thank Mr Buckland, our Site Manager, for working so hard to keep the routes in and out of the school safe during the snowy weather.


As you can see from these pictures, Mr Buckland made sure there was still plenty of snow for the children to play in on Thursday!

D-Day

Saturday 17 March

Midnight had not long struck when the British and American airborne armada began its mission in the moonlight on 6 June 1944. They landed at the edges of the five invasion areas on the Normandy coast to secure the western and eastern flanks of the beachheads and protect them from German attacks. Failure would have given Hitler the opportunity to initiate an eleventh-hour attempt to save Germany and launch his new V-weapons against British cities. Success meant the beginning of the end of the Third Reich. A soldier returns to tell of that day, one of the most important in history. Learn the difference between the weapons and equipment of the land and airborne troops and how they worked together to bring victory.

Bourne Hall Museum Kids Club bringing history alive

Wednesday
4 April
11am—12.30pm

2pm—3.30pm

Learn to shape flints like the ancient Stone Age craftsmen and discover the lost art of making stone tools. As part of a small group under the tuition of master flint knapper, James Dilley, enjoy the opportunity to make your own authentic stone age tool to take home. Learn some of the ancient survival skills needed to live in a hostile environment, where woolly mammoth and sabre toothed tigers roamed freely.

There will be an opportunity to buy some replica tools so bring some pocket money if you wish.

Children must wear trousers and closed shoes for protection during this activity, other safety equipment will be provided.

Cost per child £15, payable in advance. This includes the cost of materials to make the tool which will be yours to keep. For pre-payment please make cheques payable to E&EBC and either post or hand deliver them to Bourne Hall Museum.

Places are limited to 15 children per session so pre-booking is essential.
