We wish everyone a safe and happy Easter.




EASTER SERVICES

On Thursday morning, children in years 3 to 6 performed the events of Holy Week outside in the playground. It was a really spiritual and emotional moment as it was the first time in a year that Key Stage 2 could gather together to worship as a community. Each class re-told a part of the Easter story through narration, mime, contemplation and quiet music. The children demonstrated great reverence and it was wonderful to re-kindle that special St Clement's feeling of community and togetherness, of growing together in love and learning.

Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 children have each gathered as a class for a whole group worship where they have explored Lent as a time of new beginnings. They spoke about making a special effort during this time to do three things that were important to Jesus – praying, fasting and giving. They reminded us that we are walking for water to raise money so that all children can have access to clean and safe water close to their homes. The children have worked very hard on learning their words and speaking clearly and we are very proud of them. SHAKESPEARE WEEK

It was Shakespeare Week from 15th-21st March. Children across the school took part in various activities.


In Reception, they learnt about Shakespeare, who he was, where and when he lived and all about his family and life. They discovered that Shakespeare lived in Stratford Upon Avon with his three brothers and four sisters. His father was a glover and when he was a child they used to drink sheep's milk! His favourite lesson at school was writing and he loved watching travelling groups of actors which is why he became a playwright and actor. They also discovered that Shakespeare created the phrases 'Knock, knock!' and 'Sleep tight!'.

In Year 1, they found out about who Shakespeare was and the times he lived in. They learnt that he wrote mainly comedies and tragedies and lots of his villains were poisoned! They looked at short clips of some of his popular plays and talked about words that Shakespeare invented and are still used today, like 'hob nob', 'bedroom' and 'gloomy'.

In Year 3, they listened to the story of Hamlet, which they thoroughly enjoyed, and then used the quote 'to thine own self be true' to inspire them to write cinquains about themselves.

In Year 4, they learnt all about the life of William Shakespeare, the legacy that he left behind, as well as some fascinating facts. The children enjoyed reading and watching The Tempest, a play about magic, betrayal, love and forgiveness. They explored the characters through drama and created a mixed medium Tempest ship using paper plates, paints, crayons and other art materials.

In Year 5, they focused on Romeo and Juliet and learnt lots about Shakespeare's language. They wrote some fantastic raps and poems and performed them to each other in the playground. They really loved it and there are some budding Shakespearean rappers amongst them!





WORLD POETRY DAY

Reception


Reception enjoyed reciting some famous rhymes such as 'Jack and Jill', 'Humpty Dumpty' and 'Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star'. They tried to say these tongue twisters really quickly but it was quite tricky. They found it very funny when Mrs Howick-Smith got in a muddle!

Then they listened to the Poet Paul Cookson reading his poem 'King of all the Dinosaurs'. Reception now know that a person who writes poetry is called a poet.

Finally, the children had a go at being poets ourselves. They wrote an Acrostic Poem about 'fruit' to add to their healthy eating display.



Year 2

For World Poetry Day, Year 2 explored and learnt about shape poetry. They read different poems and tried to identify the theme of the poem from the descriptive words used and the shape of the poem. Then, in pairs, the children had a go at creating our own shape poetry based on Spring that included adjectives and similes. They enjoyed writing imaginative, creative Spring shape poetry.

Year 3

Year 3 wrote some Cinquains on the theme of 'ourselves' and 'objects'.






CAFOD 'WALK FOR WATER' CHALLENGE
