


# NEWSLETTER

This week we celebrated Pentecost! The children have been preparing themselves by talking about the Holy Spirit and how you cannot always see him but you can feel him. In one of his letters, St Paul, a famous teacher and follower of Jesus, tells us how to recognise the presence of the Holy Spirit in our lives and he calls these qualities 'fruits'.

"The fruits of the Spirit are love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control."

Just as we can tell that a tree is good because it produces good fruit, in the same way, we can tell that we are allowing the Holy Spirit to work in us, by the way we behave towards other people. The children were asked at our Gospel Assembly on Monday to remember the times when they have experienced these fruits in their lives. The children have shown many of these fruits this term in their interactions with one another and also in their work to raise money for children in poorer communities in other areas of the world. We will continue to focus on these fruits in the next half term particularly generosity as we work together as a school community to help others who are in need.



#### MAY THE MONTH OF MARY

The month of May is dedicated to Mary, our Heavenly Mother. Each class celebrated a reverent and moving prayer service in which we reflected on Mary's special qualities and asked for her intercession in our bidding prayers. We then crowned the statue of Our Lady with a garland of flowers and prayed a decade of the Rosary together.

#### ROSARY CLUB

Children throughout the school have eagerly joined the Rosary Club during lunchtimes in May. Each week, a new mystery is introduced and prayer petitions are offered up. Taking a few moments of stillness and quiet to reflect upon the life of Christ as they prayed a decade of the Rosary, has allowed the children to grow in their journey of faith and understand the Rosary as a prayer of petition.





# ASCENSION OF THE LORD MASS

On Thursday 13<sup>th</sup> May Year 5 gathered in prayer to celebrate the Feast of the Ascension of the Lord. In the readings we heard how Jesus told his disciples to go out into the world sharing the Good News. Then Jesus was taken to be with His father in Heaven. Fr Graham reminded us that we too, are called to share the Good News of Jesus through our words and actions.



# HISTORY WORSHOPS

#### Year 1

On Thursday 13<sup>th</sup> May Year 1 travelled back in time to 1492 to the busy port of Genoa in Italy where a young Christopher Columbus was fascinated by all the different traders selling spices, fine silks and new navigation instruments to help sailors travel far across the seas. Columbus was determined to become an explorer and we learnt how he went to sea when he was only 14 to learn all he could about sailing ships. He wanted to find a direct sailing route from Europe to Asia by traveling West. We travelled with him on his long voyage on the Santa Maria to the island of San Salvador where he explored the island and brought back exciting new treasures of gold, pearls and tropical birds.

Then we travelled forward in time to 1969 America where Neil Armstrong prepared to journey to the moon. We looked at similarities and differences between the lives of Neil Armstrong and Christopher Columbus. We had an exciting time travelling through space in our spaceship to land for the very first time on the moon. We explored the surface of the moon, looked at moon rocks and collected samples to bring back to earth. Then we returned to Earth safely where we were greeted with cheers and applause from everyone. We had a fun-filled afternoon and learnt lots of new and interesting facts about both explorers.





#### Year 2

Year 2 were taken back in time and met a very significant person, Florence Nightingale. They learnt about her early life and what influenced her to become a nurse. They also explored the poor conditions in British hospitals and army hospitals that Florence Nightingale worked so hard to improve. They also had a go at working in a Victorian hospital; scrubbing floors, getting rid of rats, emptying chamber pots and dressing wounds with bandages! The children had a lot of fun and enjoyed learning more about this fascinating lady.





#### YEARS 4 & 5 HISTORY WORKSHOPS

Year 4 enjoyed a Vikings Workshop with archaeologist Mortimer Wheeler. The children engaged in looking at artefacts, role playing traditional Viking families and village life and recreating Viking warrior battle scenes. The History topic this term was certainly brought to life and the children loved it!





Year 5 had a fascinating World War 2 Workshop with Bill Kitchen. The children participated in discussions about the home front, evacuation, air raid and wardens. They were able to role play and recreate what life was like then. The children were truly immersed by the experience and the children had a wonderful time!

### THE WIZARD OF OZ

On the first week back after the Easter break, the children of St Clement's were treated to a wonderful and ingenious performance of the pantomime, 'The Wizard of Oz'. Using a mixture of pre-recorded videos, live acting, audience interaction and music, the children were retold the famous story. The children had a wonderful time and enjoyed the unique experience.





# BIKEABILITY

Well done to the children in Year 4 and Year 5 who completed their Level 1 cycling proficiency in May. The Level 1 course takes place in the school playground and teaches the children how to take care of their bicycle, how to be in control of their bike and to be aware of their surroundings. This course is run by Surrey County Council. We are proud of the efforts by all of the children who took part.





# CHERTSEY MUSEUM VISIT

Year 3 had a wonderful afternoon with archaeologist, Emily Dove, who visited from Chertsey Museum to help us learn about the past using artefacts. Practising our Latin on wax tablets, building a Roman temple, making models of Roman gods and drawing artefacts were just some of the activities we enjoyed as we found out about everyday life as a Roman citizen and what it was like to be a Roman soldier.

Children in Years 1 – 6 took part in a range of activities which focussed on the skills of communication, team work, following instructions, problem solving and resilience. Lots of the Year 3 & 4 children have been enjoying their Tuesday lunch time skipping club. They have found out that skipping is actually very tricky and requires really good coordination. Girls and boys have been skipping along in time to some music. The skills they are learning are: fast skipping, simple tricks like hopscotch and running skipping. Lots of the children have tried skipping with a partner and jumping into and out of a spinning rope. All children have learnt something new or improved their skipping style. Above all, they are becoming fitter, are having fun and they have found out that skipping is actually very hard work!

The Year 5 & 6 children have really enjoyed coming to the Thursday after school netball club. They have been learning skills to improve their agility, balance and coordination as well as ball handling skills. They have played small-sided netball-based games and have been introduced to the rules of Hi 5 netball. Team spirit is high and everyone is developing their sense of good sportsmanship whilst having great fun at the same time. We definitely have some budding netballers amongst them!
