SAFER INTERNET DAY

To help celebrate and promote Safer Internet Day on the 08th February, children across the school have been reminded about their responsibilities when it comes to Online Safety. Each class participated in different activities throughout the day. To help foster a positive and safe environment, please can I encourage you to maintain conversations with your children about their online presence as well as supervise their online usage and screen time on mobiles, tablets, gaming consoles and computers.

In Hedgehog Class, they learned all about the Internet and how it is used to find out information, watch films, play games and talk to people on tablets, laptops, computers and phones. They watched a video and a story which taught them who can keep them safe when they use the Internet and they discussed and drew pictures of the people who keep them safe or who they need to talk to if they see something that worries them or should not be there.


Year 1 listened to the story of Buddy the Dog's Internet Safety Story. The story specifically focuses on the safe use of tablets and smartphones. The children learnt Buddy's catchy song and decorated posters reminding them to stay safe online.

After reading 'Digi Duck and the Magical Castle', Year 2 explored what information is safe to be online and what information should be kept private. They discussed who they should trust with their information and placed them on circle of trusts. Finally, they created 'Kinder Internet Spells' to promote kindness online.

KS2 joined the Barclays Code Playground Online Session where they created a fun Safer Internet Day quiz using Scratch. Year 4 also created a 'Recipe for Respectful Relationships Online'.

Make a "Wombling Free" scarecrow for this year's event


Our scarecrow competition is back! Local primary schools and youth groups are invited to submit their best creative work "making good use" of pre-loved and recycled materials in a Wombles themed pageant.

Scarecrow criteria:

- Entries must follow the theme of 'the Wombles'
- Props may be used
- Scarecrows must include some plant material which can be living, fresh or dried, and be made from recycled and sustainable materials as much as possible
- They should be no taller than 1.8m and be able to withstand all weather conditions.

Scarecrows must be brought to Bourne Hall on Wednesday 9 March and will be judged by the Mayor of Epsom & Ewell.
