### THE YOUNG SHAKESPEARE COMPANY

On Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> January, Year 5 and 6 were lucky enough to watch four wonderful actors from The Young Shakespeare Company perform the enchanting comic tale 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' in a fast-moving fully-costumed interactive production. The play was brought vividly to life for the children, at times including the whole audience to create such enchanting scenes as the wood full of mysterious fairies and sprites.

Throughout the performance, the children become actively involved in the play through a carefully structured range of drama and language activities. They were encouraged to explore the motives, thoughts and feelings of the characters, exploring in detail how Hermia and her friends feel at every twist and turn of their confused night in the forest. Volunteers from among the children were also chosen to become individual characters in the story and all the children had the opportunity to speak and enjoy Shakespeare's words in short, accessible sections.

As always, this was a brilliant opportunity for the children to experience the work of Shakespeare in a fun and accessible way. The actors brought each character from A Midsummer Night's dream to life and Year 6 have gone on to produce some superb writing based on the play and hopefully, have ignited a spark of interest in every child in Years 5 and 6!

#### YEAR 3 & 4 CLASS MASS

The Year 3 and 4 children celebrated mass on the 30<sup>th</sup> January with Father Graham. The theme was Talents. On **Tuesday 6th February** we took part in the nationwide **Safer Internet Day 2024**. Throughout the school, children took part in activities exploring the wonders of technology and how to remain safe and happy online. This year's focus was what to do if an aspect of their online experience changes. Whether it's making sure new friends are who they say they are; a website's information can be trusted or how to keep data safe; children should be one step closer to be feeling confident and secure: Tell an adult, report it, block it, talk about it. ### ECO COMMITTEE WORKSHOP HOGSMILL RIVER

On Wednesday 6<sup>th</sup> February the children enjoyed being Junior River Rangers as they travelled on an interactive journey along the Hogsmill River from its source at Bourne Hall to its mouth where it joins the River Thames. The children recognized lots of local landmarks as they travelled along the Hogsmill River and learnt about the history of the river and the use of watermills. They were introduced to the wildlife that live in and around the river- eels, kingfisher, stickleback fish, ducks and herons and learnt some catchy ways to remember their names- knock kneed heron. They also found out about the threat that face the animals that have made the river their home.



#### THE BIG GARDEN BIRDWATCH

On Friday 26<sup>th</sup> January, the children of St Clement's took part in The Big Garden Birdwatch in collaboration with the RSPB. They made an hour of time count by joining hundreds of thousands of people across the UK who took part in this national survey. The nature and climate emergency threatens even our most familiar birds, which means every bird that they counted matters. By taking part in The Big Garden Birdwatch, the children helped the RSPB to understand how our garden birds are doing, taking action to help wildlife thrive for generations to come. We believe the children had a fantastic hour with nature, spotting many different species of birds across the grounds of St Clement's.
