YEAR 5 AND YEAR 6 FRIENDSHIP MASS

Towards the beginning of the term, Year 5 and Year 6 took part in a Mass about friendship. The children from both classes practised the different parts of the Mass, prayers and scripture so that they were ready to share the Mass with their families that were able to attend. Fr Graham helped us to learn about how friendship is important and that Jesus is our closest ally.

YEAR 6 JUNIOR CITIZENS

Year 6 are our Junior Citizens!

On Wednesday, 21st February, Year 6 travelled to Epsom Downs Race Course to take part in the annual Junior Citizens event. There were many organisations there who were teaching us how to stay safe in multiple situations. Here is a summary of each one!

Hope UK taught us about safe and unsafe drugs, including drugs we might use at home to make us feel better if we are unwell, such as Calpol or Paracetamol, then others that we are all familiar with, such as alcohol and cigarettes. Did you know that there are over 4,000 chemicals in just one cigarette? This is what makes them so addictive - so don't start to begin with! We also talked about more dangerous drugs which we may come into contact with as we get older and the main lesson we learned was "If you don't know what's in it, DON'T TOUCH IT!"

The British Transport Police are a national police service for the railway system throughout Great Britain. The service is also responsible for policing the London Underground system, the Docklands Light Railway, the Midland Metro and Croydon Tramlink. We are now far more aware of the dangers around trainlines and level crossings; the railway is full of hidden dangers! If you trespass on the railway there can be serious and catastrophic consequences for you, your families, rail staff, and communities as a whole. Do you really know the potential risks of trespassing? When you step on the track you face 75,000 volts of electricity, 400 tonnes of train, and the electrified third rail. Keep safe and remember ... "Everyone loses when you step on the track." RNLI (The Royal National Lifeboat Institution) taught us how to plan for a trip near water, what to take and what to do, and how to identify possible dangers by rivers, lakes and the sea. The most important information we learnt was "Stop and think, Stay together, Float, Call 999 or 112."

A new addition for this year was the Thames Basin Heaths Partnership. The Thames Basin Heath is an amazing

place, made up of fragments of Heathland and habitats spanning over 8,200 hectares across Surrey, Hampshire and Berkshire. We learnt about the danger of wild fires and the responsibility we have to protect our wild animals and their habitats.

It was a marvellous day, enjoyed by all and the behaviour of Year 6 was impeccable! We were so proud of their enthusiasm and general knowledge!



WHO CARES CAREER PRESENTATION

Years 5 and 6 were very lucky to have an exciting workshop all about the different jobs in the NHS. We took a trip through time to explore different medical practices and then found out how the heroes of the NHS heal us today.



WORLD BOOK DAY

On Thursday 7th March, we had a huge amount of fun celebrating World Book Day! At St Clement's we really enjoy books, and this was a brilliant way to celebrate our love of reading. Children took part in lots of book themed activities, and KS2 children visited KS1 children to read their favourite books. They all had a great time!

It was lovely to see such imagination as the children came to school dressed as their favourite book characters. Thank you for all the effort made. We celebrated together as a whole school and really enjoyed seeing everyone's outfits!





EPSOM PLAYHOUSE

During the last week of the term, 15 children from Year 5 performed in the Epsom Music Festival at the Epsom Playhouse. They were joined by many schools from around our local area who sang a variety of songs from many different genres. For many weeks, the whole class has practiced singing the piece 'I am the Earth' by Glyn Lehmann. At the end of the performance all the schools came together and sang a great number – Pentatonix. Well done Year 5!



SCIENCE WEEK

British Science Week is a ten-day celebration of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics which took place between 8th-15th March. The theme for 2024 was 'Time for Science'. To begin our celebrations, St Clement's had an assembly led by Jackson from AS Creatives based on this year's theme. Then each class had a follow up workshop on a theme linked to time. Reception looked at human life cycles and how we grow and change over time. Year 1 explored seasonal changes and how the length of the day changes throughout the year. Year 2 looked at lifespan timelines and why different animals have different life spans. Year 3 explore geology timelines and how are understanding of rocks can help us understand Earth's history. Year 4 learned more about electricity, looking at the history of electricity and recent developments with electricity. Year 5 explored space timelines and significant events in space exploration. They also learnt about the inspirational, female scientists Catherine Johnson and Caroline Herschel as without them our journey towards the stars would not have been as successful as it has been. Year 6 looked at evolution timelines and how we can use Darwin's personal timeline as a metaphor for the evolutionary timeline that culminated in humankind.

Across the 10 days, a variety of Science activities were completed across different year groups. In Year 5 they learnt about beams and arch bridges, using card and books to create their own versions of bridges and testing to see how much weight they can carry. They also planted daffodils and will be carrying out experiments with them. In Year 2 they explored different offspring and their life cycles and completed an experiment on growth. Also children in KS2 planted seeds and living plants in their class planters and over time will monitor how these grow.

As part of Science week, the whole school also took part in the annual Baylab lab coat competition. This year's theme was 'Going Digital'. We had so many amazing entries, it was difficult to choose which ones to send in! Hopefully we will hear soon if any of our entries our winners.

Throughout Science week, the children enthusiastically took part in the Science activities and displayed and used a variety of scientific skills, showing a curiosity to learn more. They are all budding scientists!



MINI NETBALL RALLY

On Wednesday 6th March, we took 2 netball teams to a mini rally at Wallace Fields Junior school. We took 18 children from Years 5 and 6 to show off their netball skills. We played an A team mini rally and a B team mini rally. Three schools took part - Us, Wallace Fields and Meadow. All the children were so excited and a little nervous to start with but, as they played, they all grew in confidence showing that hard work and determination really pays off.

The B team played Wallace Fields B first and lost 4 - 6 and you could see that there were a few nerves but then played Meadow B and won 7 - 3!

The A team played Meadow A first and won 4 - 3. It was such a close game and very well matched but we just pipped it at the end. Then we played Wallace Fields A and won 11 - 3!

There was some brilliant passing and great attacking and defending. You could also see how those footwork drills were paying off too. Some superb shooting showed how those mini basketball games in the playground made a difference. Having the opportunity to play against other teams is a really important chance for them to mix with other children of the same age from other schools. The Year 6s may have even met new friends that will also be going to the same secondary school!

As usual, myself and Mrs Regan were so proud of the children. They are always so polite and never let us down.

Thank you to Wallace Fields for hosting, Mrs Regan, my co coach and to all those parents for their support from the side lines. Well done netballers!

YEAR 2 FRESHWATER THEATRE WORKSHOP

On Wednesday 28th February, Year 2 took part in a workshop called 'Continents and Oceans.' The workshop allowed the children to review and recall their learning of their Geography unit. embedded their understanding and brought their learning to life. First they named the continents and oceans, creating a human globe to demonstrate this. Then they explored different, significant human and physical features in the continents. They packed their bags, travelled using appropriate transportation methods and considered the appropriate clothing and resources needed! The children thoroughly enjoyed the workshop and were engaged and enthusiastic.



YEAR 1 FRESHWATER THEATRE WORKSHOP

Year 1 enjoyed being curators of a toy museum, comparing toys from the past and present discussing similarities, difference and materials used to make them. They then role played inventing their own toy of the future.



YEAR 5 MATHS CHALLENGE

On Thursday 29th February, 8 children in teams of 4 took part in the Year 5 Maths Challenge. We were one of 250 schools in England and Europe that took part.

This friendly, online, inter-school competition gave teams of Year 5 children the opportunity to apply their mathematics knowledge and teamwork skills to solve problems and answer challenging questions, putting their reasoning skills to the test.

The hour-long heat comprised of a set of 4 equally weighted rounds.

Round 1: General maths questionsRound 2: Estimation roundRound 3: Memory round (completed beforehand)Round 4: More general maths questions

As the titles of each round suggest, success in the challenges relies on much more than mere mathematical calculation. The teams were challenged with problem-solving, reasoning, estimation, visualisation, memory and arithmetic from across the mathematics curriculum. Our Year 5 teams took part remotely from the classroom.

The children had to work hard at working as a team, delegating parts of questions, explaining really clearly to their team mates and agreeing with each other under very tight time constraints. All the children worked exceptionally hard and really enjoyed the afternoon scoring really well. Unfortunately, they didn't make it to the top 20 and so didn't qualify for the final but we are very proud of their achievement. Thank you to Mr Preston and especially to Mrs Maslowska for helping to prepare the children. Well done Year 5 mathematicians!





BOURNE HALL LIBRARY TRIP

Year 1 and Year 4 went to explore the huge selection of children's books at our local library. The children went on a scavenger hunt around the children's section to delve into factual books about trains and animals and different types of stories that can make you laugh, feel sad or happy.



BSL LESSON

The Level 1 course takes place in the school playground and teaches the children how to take care of their bicycle, how to be in control of their bike and to be aware of their surroundings. There are also children's races over various distances (100m - 400m) on the athletics track before the main event (depending on the number of entrants). Entry to the children's races will be £1 and can be made in person on race day. Children's races will start at 9.30 am.

Please note that this race does not permit the use of headphones except for bone-conducting headphones permitted by UK Athletics.

Entry is £20 with UK Athletics affiliated runners and £22 for non-affiliated.

The closing date for entries is 12 noon on 26 April 2024.
